White Tower of Thessaloniki (https://www.lpth.gr/indexeg.php)

The White Tower was built in the fifteenth century after the fall of Thessaloniki to the Ottomans in 1430. At its location there had been an older tower belonging to Thessaloniki's Byzantine fortifications, where the eastern wall met the sea wall. The Tower was the eastern end of the sea wall; there was another at the western end, and a third in between.

3. Kechris Winery (https://www.kechris.gr/en/)

KECHRIS Winery & Distillery is a modern family business that specializes in the vinification of high-quality retsina, keeping up a century-long tradition in the production of wines and traditional liqueurs, which are unique in their type. By drawing inspiration from the family tradition and by applying the most modern winemaking techniques, KECHRIS produces white and red wines, and liqueurs.

4. Ktima Kir-Yianni (https://kiryianni.gr/)

The Kyr-Giannis estate was founded in 1897, by Giannis Boutaris, one of the prominent personalities of the Greek winemaking. The winery and the Kyr-Giannis estate are located in Giannakochori, Naoussa, covering an area of over 560 acres. The Xinomavro, Syrah, Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon varieties are grown there. The climate of the area as well as the soil rich in nutrients, create the ideal conditions for the cultivation of grapes.

5. Porto Carras Estate (https://www.portocarras.com/porto-carras/domaine/?)

The Porto Carras estate is located in the beautiful Sithonia of Halkidiki and is the largest organic vineyard in Greece and one of the largest in Europe. The vineyard cultivates many varieties of white wine such as Assyrtiko, Malagouzia and Sauvignon Blanc, but also famous varieties of red grapes such as Limnio, the oldest variety that exists and has been cultivated since the time of Aristotle. Porto Carras is the epitome of wine tourism as it offers its guests the opportunity not only to take a tour of it, but also to stay in the

elegant and comfortable hotel located within its property, the Meliton Hotel. The estate of Porto Carras, as well as the hotel complex located in it have a long tradition dating back to 1965, resulting in the impeccable organization and service of its guests.

Wine tasting sessions are held daily throughout the year at Melissanthi Wine Tasting Room. To best plan your visit, you can contact the Winery at (+30) 2375077437. You may also enjoy an unforgettable tour of the vineyard grounds, offering panoramic Aegean sea views over the Sithonia peninsula, the vast vineyards across the Meliton slopes and the continuous picturesque coves framing Porto Carras.

City Activities

1. Have a memorable dining experience at the modern OTE Tower

Built in 1966 the OTE Tower, a 76-meter high building towering over central Thessaloniki was previously used for television and communications in the 60s-70s, until receiving a renovation in 2005. With its incredible sights of the city and water, and its rotating feature making it stand out from any other modern attraction in the city, make sure to stop by for a memorable dining experience, where you'll get the best 360-degree views of the city, paired with a 5-star meal.

2. Plan a cinematic evening at an outdoor cinema.

Check out Summer Cinema Ellinis, creating a shady and fresh ambiance tucked into a lush garden away from the traffic of the city, dressed in the true Greek colors of blue and white.

Featuring a great variety of movies is Open Air Cinema Apollo, also situated in the heart of the city, surrounded by lush greenery, apartment buildings, and is known for its remarkably great sound system and movie-watching experience.

Short distance trips (1-2 hours from the city)

1. Take a day trip to Halkidiki: Beach Bliss and Beyond

Just a short drive from Thessaloniki, Halkidiki offers some of the most beautiful beaches in Greece. Explore the three peninsulas – Kassandra, Sithonia, and Athos – each with its unique charm. Whether you seek adventure, tranquility, or spiritual reflection, Halkidiki has it all.

2. Mount Olympus: A Mythical Adventure.

6. Kavala Ammolofoi (https://www.visitkavala.gr/en/sightseeing/ammolofoi/)

West of Peramos you will find the exotic beaches of Ammolofoi. The fine white sand in combination with the clear waters will enchant you! This is the busiest place, especially for the young of Eastern Macedonia, whose weekend parties last late into the night! Of course, if you seek more quiet corners, then you will easily discover them! You can get here by taking the long distance bus as far as Nea Peramos and from there walk or take a taxi. During the summer period the bus continues for Ammolofoi.

Home to one of the highest mountain ranges in the Aegean Samothrace is an unspoiled and majestic Greek island where nature is still in its wilder forms. Visit its clear streams of cascading waterfalls and rock pools for swimming and enjoy the green landscapes even in late summer.

There is evidence of human activity on the rich with archaeological treasures island since the Neolithic times. But it's the Kaviria Mysteries – religious event of great importance, equal to that of the Eleusinian Mysteries - that brought the island's fame to the top. The grandeur of the archaeological prominence of Samothrace stretches over the 50-square-kilometres site of Palaiopolis, at 6,5km from the port of Kamariotissa.

The cruise to Mount Athos departs from Ouranoupolis twice a day with the "Captain Fotis" boat of 300 seats. Daily from the 1st of April until the 31st of October and at 10:30 (Morning Cruise 1a) and 14:00 (Noon Cruise 1b). The afternoon cruise to Mount Athos is available from the 15th of May until the 15th of October. The duration of the cruise to Mount Athos is three hours.



North Aegean (Limnos, Lesbos, Chios, Samos, Fournoi, Ikaria)

Limnos - An island of sheer beauty (https://www.visitgreece.gr/islands/north-aegean-islands/limnos/)

Limnos is a beautiful North Aegean Sea island, which was shaped by volcanic eruptions in the distant past. It is a place with a centuries-old history, and a popular holiday destination that will capture your heart - the perfect place to chill out. You will see imposing rock formations, peculiar volcanic landscapes, rolling green hills, extensive plots of fertile land, huge sand dunes, and wetlands brimming with life. The island is home to archaeological sites, fortresses, traditional villages, hospitable locals, and a particular & delicious cuisine among the best in the Aegean Sea, with products which have been famous ever since antiquity, such as wine, honey, cheese, fresh fish & seafood dishes: for all the above reasons Limnos Island will surely rank high on your list of favourite holiday destinations.

The magnificent island of Lesvos is the third largest of the country. Enjoy the mild mediterranean climate, the rich flora and fauna, the springs, the olive groves, the petrified forest, the picturesque traditional villages, the delicious local products (such as ouzo and olive oil) and the island's subsequent architecture to the 19th century industrial development.

Throughout the ages, Lesvos contribution to the arts is priceless. During antiquity and contemporary times, prominent members of the arts and politics, were born on this particular island. You might have heard of some of them: Sappho (poet), Alcaeus (poet), Arion (poet and musician), Terpander (poet), Theophrastos (philosopher), Pittacus of Mytilene (statesman and sage), Theophilos (painter), Elias Venezis (novelist), Stratis Myrivilis (writer), and the nobelist Odysseas Elytis (poet, essayist).

Natives to Samos' are the Mythical Goddess Hera, the philosopher Epicurus, the astronomer Aristarchus and the great mathematician Pythagoras.

You have two UNESCO monuments to visit: the fortified ancient city of Pythagoreion and the ancient Temple of Hera, Heraion of Samos. Don't miss the pleasant cultural events and music festivals during the summer months and get acquainted with the island's history by wandering around the historic village of Vathy.

The thermal springs on the island are renowned for their chemical composition. The unparalleled local lifestyle, along with the one of a kind work-rest schedule, the famous festivals and traditional dances, the local customs, are just some of the reasons why you should explore this impressive destination. Enjoy its beautiful gorges. Swim in the crystal clear waters. Savour fresh fish and sip fragrant wine, while you let yourselves become an Ikarian, as they are connoisseurs of the secrets for longevity!

Fournoi - An archipelago away from the crowds (https://www.visitgreece.gr/islands/north-aegean-islands/fournoi/)

An ideal base for pirates in the Middle Ages, due to the hundreds of small fjords and hidden beaches where their ships could be concealed, Fournoi were once called "Corseoi Islands", after corsairs, i.e. pirates.

There are ancient finds scattered throughout the island dating back to the Ionians, Classical and Hellenistic times. The Cyclopean wall with traces of an Acropolis on the Hill of Ai Giorgis, the

ruins of the ancient temple at Kamari and the remains of homes on the sea bed, the shrine to Poseidon at Agia Triada in Chrysomilia, the ancient quarry at Petrokopio.

As a matter of fact, Fournoi is not just one island, but a formation of small ones, of which only two are inhabited: Fournoi and Thymaina. Islands of fishermen and beekeepers, they provide visitors with all basic comforts.

Psara - The island of glorious past & pristine beauty (https://www.visitgreece.gr/islands/north-aegean-islands/psara/)

Travel guides describe the island as "a dot in the sea, far away from established tourism destinations" – but that is only half true, because on this dot shrewd travellers from around the world discover – or, better yet, create – their own personal paradise, with the materials offered by the untamed nature of the Aegean Sea.

The people of Psara are, first and foremost, proud of their glorious past. The revolutionary flag of 1821 – white and red, with a cross and an anchor wrapped by a serpent – welcomes visitors at the harbour, reminding them that the history of this island is interwoven with the history of its untamed soul.

Skiathos, the most cosmopolitan island in the Northern Sporades, is truly a paradise on earth, with lush pine forests and crystal-clear azure waters. The island is picturesque, unspoilt and blessed with more than 60 beautifully crystal-clear waters and beaches. The most famous is Koukounaries, which is considered as the third most beautiful beach in the Mediterranean. When you add in its bustling nightlife, it is only natural

that the island attracts thousands of young visitors every year!
